he creative journey between an artist and a curator is a unique and evolving partnership, one that grows richer with each new creative project. As a curator, artist, writer, publisher, and art project manager, I know how important it is to have a strong artistic bond and a close understanding of the artist's work.

My collaboration with Nigerian artist Olorunyemi Kolapo Obadiah began as the curator of his first solo exhibition, *Responsive Eye* in Abuja. It has since blossomed through various projects, such as a residency, collective exhibitions, a duet exhibition called *Afrotopia*, in Abuja alongside Olawuyi Oluwole, his first international exhibition *Beyond the Obvious* in Vigo, Spain, and a collective in London, titled *Art in Mind*. Now, our journey brings us to *Nutopia: Beyond Skin Colour, What Defines Us?* in New Delhi, India.

Nutopia, a fusion of two concepts—'new' and 'utopia'— is the culmination of years of artistic and conceptual exploration. It is deeply rooted in the dreams Kolapo experienced during the *Beyond the Obvious* exhibition. These dreams sparked the vision of *Nutopia: Beyond Skin Colour, What Defines Us?*, a place where the past and future converge, blending African traditions with the imaginative possibilities of *Afrofuturism*.

This exhibition is also a continuation of the work started in the *Afrotopia* exhibition and features 15 paintings and two sculptures. In these thought-provoking works, Kolapo masterfully blends elements of tradition with the visionary scope of *Afrofuturism*. Each piece is a testament to Kolapo's mastery and his relentless pursuit of understanding African identity through art. The works are more than just visual expressions; they are profound meditations on what it means to be African in a world where cultural identity is continually reshaped by history, technology, and the future.

Kolapo's exploration is not merely artistic; it is deeply rooted in a personal quest for understanding and a desire to reconnect with the ancestral ties that bind us. His travels across Africa have enriched his perspective, allowing him to portray a nuanced narrative that is both a reflection of the past and an aspiration for what could be.

Through *Nutopia: Beyond Skin Colour, What Defines Us?*, Kolapo challenges us to reconsider what defines us, to see beyond the surface, and to envision a world where identity is a source of strength and pride. It is a world where the echoes of history are woven into the fabric of tomorrow, creating a tapestry that is as vibrant as it is inspiring.

The Resilient Spirits: Awelewa Awakens series, for instance, vividly portrays the resilience of African women, depicted with elongated necks that symbolise grace and strength. These figures wear futuristic masks that conceal their faces, representing both the hidden struggles and the deep



connection to cultural heritage, as seen through elements inspired by traditional African artefacts.

In **Yellow Saviour**, Kolapo creates a striking image of a yellow-tinged shepherd robot guarding a flock of sheep. This painting is a powerful metaphor for the balance between technology and nature, where the robot, inspired by African design, offers protection and hope in a future where these forces coexist harmoniously.

Gilded Identity is another standout piece, depicting a Black man adorned with a golden mask that merges the traditional Benin Idia mask with futuristic elements. This artwork invites viewers to explore the complexities of identity, where tradition and modernity intersect, challenging us to consider how we define ourselves in an everchanging world.

Finally, *A Shared History* reminds us of the unbreakable bonds that tie African nations together. The connected helmets in the painting symbolise the shared history and collective memory that transcend borders, linking the past with the future. The approaching robot in the painting is not just a symbol of technological advancement but a call to honour our heritage as we move forward.

The exhibition is an invitation in which Kolapo offers a vision of a world where African culture is not only celebrated but reimagined in the context of a 'new utopia'—one that honours the past while embracing the future with confidence, beauty, and creativity.

Our creative collaboration has been fruitful, evolving from *Responsive Eye* to this current exhibition, *Nutopia: Beyond Skin Colour, What Defines Us?* At each step of the journey, Kolapo has inspired me—and I believe all of us—to deepen our understanding of the fascinating themes of identity, resilience, and the interplay between past and future.

As you engage with this collection, I encourage you to embrace the stories it tells, to reflect on the themes it presents, and to imagine the possibilities it offers, considering how they all resonate with your own experiences.



About the Artist



Born in Ilorin, Nigeria, Kolapo's artistic journey ignited as a teenager, fueled by the readily available charcoal and diverse surfaces that surrounded him. Despite pursuing a career in Physics, as per his parents' wishes, the pull of artistry proved irresistible. He embarked on his professional art journey in 2005, eventually earning their support after graduation.

Kolapo's unique perspective stems from his dual passions: art and science (specifically physics). This allows him to investigate and illustrate the nuances of identity and emotions through his captivating portraits, primarily rendered in oil and charcoal. Earning a B.Sc. in Applied Physics equipped him with an additional layer of understanding, which he seamlessly integrates into his artistic exploration.

Following participation in numerous international group exhibitions and few local solo exhibitions, Kolapo reached a significant milestone in 2022 with his debut international solo exhibition in Vigo, Spain. His dedication to artistic freedom extends beyond his own practice. In 2016, he established "Elbowroom," an art movement fostering creative expression among young realistic artists.

Kolapo's artistic footprint spans across Africa, Europe, the UK, Asia, and America, with five acclaimed solo exhibitions and countless group showcases under his belt. He is currently engrossed in a new body of work delving into Futurism's attempt to revolutionize cultural identity. This exploration juxtaposes the envisioned beauty of a modern life against the potential loss of African identity within this utopian ideal, questioning the boundaries between utopia and dystopia.





Utopia: Beyond Skin Colour, What Defines Us? is an exhibition by Nigerian artist Olorunyemi Kolapo Obadiah, curated by artist, curator, and writer Susa Rodriguez-Garrido. The project is an exploration of the intersection of Black identity, culture, and tradition with the futuristic and imaginative world of Afrofuturism. The name Nutopia is derived from the words "new" and "utopia". The project is a collection of Kolapo's paintings and writings on the subject, inspired by a series of dreams about Afrofuturism.

In his dreams, Kolapo envisioned a series of Afrofuturistic scenes where Black people in the future bore traditional African tribal marks and tattoos, among other forms of identity, and were taking over the world. These dreams inspired Kolapo to create a series of paintings that depict this vision of the future, in which the glory of Black culture is restored and celebrated.

To further explore these ideas, Kolapo also travelled to Zambia, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Kenya, and other parts of Africa to research the lost identities and traditions of these cultures. Through his travels, he gained a deeper understanding of the challenges and opportunities facing Black nations today, and he used this knowledge to inform his paintings. The resulting works depict a range of subjects, from traditional African rituals and customs to futuristic technology and science fiction.

Through his artwork, Kolapo seeks to challenge traditional notions of Black identity and explore the possibilities of a new, Afrofuturist future. By blending the past and the future, he creates a unique and imaginative vision of the Black present and its potential.

In addition to his artwork, Kolapo also includes essays and other writings in the form of an art book, where he discusses the ideas and themes that inspired his work. In these writings, he explores the impact of colonial rule on African identity, culture, and tradition, and how this impact continues to shape the continent today. For example. the suppression of traditional practices, such as tribal markings and tattoos, was a blow to African identity, as they represented a connection to the continent's rich cultural heritage. However, in recent years, there has been a resurgence of interest in these practices among young Africans, as they seek to reclaim their cultural heritage and assert their identity in the face of ongoing globalisation and Westernisation.



A SHARED HISTORY

As an artist who is rooted in the essence of African heritage, I've always sought to explore the strong connections that bind us across time and space. *A Shared History* embodies this vision—a celebration of our collective past and a contemplation of our shared future as Africans.

This painting speaks to the unbreakable bond that ties us to our ancestors. The connected helmets are a metaphor for the shared history that we, as Africans, carry within us—a history that transcends borders, linking Nigeria, Ghana, Kenya, South Africa, and every other nation on our continent. Despite our diverse cultures, languages, and traditions, our histories are entwined, reflecting common struggles, triumphs, and hopes.

The flying robot approaching the couple is not just a symbol of the future, but a reminder that as we move forward, the essence of who we are—our identity and culture—remains a vital part of our journey. It challenges us to preserve what is unique to us as Africans while embracing the innovations of tomorrow.

Through this work, I aim to inspire a dialogue about the balance between honouring our past and navigating the future. As we continue to evolve, it is this shared history that will illuminate our path, ensuring that our identities remain resilient and our cultures, ever vibrant.

The Resilient Spirits: Awelewa Awakens is a captivating painting series that explores the decolonisation of Nigeria's history through the depiction of African women with exceptionally long necks. These women symbolise the strength, grace, and resilience of the African spirit, transcending the confines of colonial narratives and embracing a powerful identity.

In this series, each woman's face, from the nose up, is concealed by a futuristic mask. These masks represent the dualities faced by African women—their hidden struggles, the silencing of their voices, and the preservation of their cultural heritage. Incorporated into the upper part of each mask are elements inspired by African artefact mask sculptures, emphasising a connection to the ancestral past and the importance of cultural memory.

This work is an ode to identity, transformation, and the timeless journey of self discovery, where the spirit of the past walks hand in hand with the possibilities of tomorrow.




VEIL OF PAST, PRESENT AND POSSIBILITY

The fusion of the futuristic design with the echoes of the Benin Idia mask signifies a harmonious interplay between tradition and progress, inviting the viewers to contemplate the interconnection of the past, present, and future.

The golden mask itself represents more than just an ornament but also a value. It is a metaphorical shield that protects and empowers the individual. It embodies the transformative power of technology, which enables individuals to shape and redefine their identities in an ever-evolving world. Through this mask, the man gains a new perspective on the world, embracing both his heritage and the possibilities of the future.

It invites viewers to reflect on themes of identity, self-discovery, and the impact of technology on our lives as I take you through a new series of

paintings on the past, present, and future of our identity as Africans. It challenges preconceived notions and encourages a deeper understanding of the complexity of individuality, emphasising that our identities are not fixed but continuously influenced by our cultural roots and the ever-changing modern landscape.

As viewers engage with *Gilded Identity*, they are compelled to ponder the significance of personal masks and the power they hold in shaping our perception of ourselves and others. The artwork ultimately calls for introspection, encouraging viewers to embrace their multifaceted identities, celebrate their heritage, and navigate the uncharted territories of the future with confidence and authenticity.
